IN 2020

RESIDENTIAL

- Some 25,000 hours of individual, group and family therapy sessions provided by 12 master level professional therapists.
- 150 youth in residential care.
- 250 youth in transitional or independent living, including young mothers, who are aging out of the foster care system.
- · 84 foster families.
- Equine assisted psychotherapy with three EAGALA (Equine Assisted Growth and Learning Association) certified professionals.

TRANSITIONAL

- Footsteps (males) and Laura's Home (females) are homes providing assistance in learning how to live independently: Budgeting, cleaning and cooking. All are completing school or have a job.
- Leonard's Landing includes eight apartments for youth transitioning from a structured environment, but still benefiting from staff assistance.

FAMILY SERVICES

(STABILIZATION SERVICES IN 2021)

- Recruits and trains foster families to assist the specific needs of our youth.
- Aftercare, a service to continue some basic support as appropriate to either youth or foster families.

Angie Siceluff, clinical director, received the 2020 Child Health Advocate of the Year Award.




IMENTS



A year in which many were relegated to their homes. At the Good Samaritan Boys Ranch, the mission never changed. Take care of the kids and families in our care, and take care of each other. Our staff showed up day in and day out. They tolerated masks, risked sickness, and came together for our common mission, rather than focusing on our differences.

Fiscally, 2020 will go down as one of the most successful years the Good Samaritan Boys Ranch has ever seen. Our supporters showed that we were not forgotten as we battled on the front lines. Since 2015 our operating budget has gone from 5 million dollars to nearly 10 million. We have seen exponential growth during uncertain times.

As a result of this, we have been able to systematically begin making upgrades to some of our aging facilities. Physical environment is such an important component to promote hope and healing. It is our hope to continue to provide the best possible facilities for our kids and staff as we continue to look towards the future.

For 2021 and beyond, I am filled with hope and excitement. For so many years the Good Samaritan Boys Ranch has set the standard for helping kids who could not help themselves. Thousands of foster kids have entered and exited our programs. We have helped them heal and helped them prepare for what is ahead.

The time has come for us to do more than just help kids put the pieces of their lives back together.

Beginning this year, the Good Samaritan Boys Ranch will begin to focus on prevention and stabilization for children and families. Imagine a

world in which abuse and neglect are a thing of the past. Our goal is to be able to provide support for kids and families before the walls start to crumble. We are excited to be adding three new programs to our service array over the next 12 months. The first is School Based Counseling for the Pleasant Hope School District. Pleasant Hope has been a wonderful partner providing educational support for all the boys in our Specialized Treatment program in Brighton. We are honored to return the favor by providing the opportunity for emotional support to all students in the Pleasant Hope School District beginning in the Fall of 2021.

Additionally, we are starting a parenting program for parents of young children. It is our goal to strengthen and educate over 80 parents/families over the next year. In doing so, we hope to reduce the number of kids that come into the Foster Care System, and equip parents with the skills to provide a loving, safe, nurturing environment for their family.

Lastly, we will be entering into a partnership with Greene County. Providing support services to help strengthen and preserve adoptive families. Foster and Adoptive parents are providing such a valuable service to our community, they need all the support they can get, and we are honored to provide that support.

As 2020 becomes a distant memory, we realize that this last year has left an indelible mark on all of us for years to come. Thank you to all of our Good Samaritans who have come alongside us this year, those who have stayed with us for so many years. You are helping us have an incredible impact on the lives of kids and families throughout the great state of Missouri.
